The Denver Regional Council of Governments (DRCOG) respectfully submits this letter of support for the City of Aurora's request for Congressionally Directed Spending for the Box Elder Creek Roadway Improvement project.

The City seeks funding to reconstruct flood-damaged 56th Avenue and Hudson Road, and to implement additional design and construction features to mitigate against future flood risks such as high storm water run-off and substantially increased creek flows. We believe the project is necessary for the rapid recovery of these key arterial roads and their continued operation through future severe weather events.

56th Avenue and Hudson Road washed out during a heavy rain fall event in June 2023 when Box Elder Creek jumped its banks and overwhelmed existing drainage infrastructure. Miles of closures due to flood damage have restricted access to critical facilities in the region, including Denver International Airport (DEN), Colorado Air and Space Port, and a variety of logistics and distribution companies.
