We have been in discussion with AuMHC for several months to also house our services on this campus in addition to increasing affordable housing. The combination of these services will make a significant impact on our community and your constituents.

This location will be sensitive to the needs of this population, who also often have unidentified and untreated trauma. We are excited that this facility will be designed to be welcoming and with a trauma informed lens. We are encouraged that our clients can count on receiving immediate services with a structured model that offers comprehensive care in a continuum that meets their mental and physical needs. We believe this concept of a one-stop access point will allow our clients and our staff to receive the necessary supports in a more holistic and expedited manner, from a trusted community partner that has served our community for many years.
