We are writing to express our support for the Adams County Government and Judicial District 17 Community Funding Project (CFP) Request titled "Expanding Services to Domestic Violence Victims in Adams County."

In 2020, there were approximately 2,756 domestic violence arrests in the 17th Judicial District. Currently, in the 17th Judicial District there is a lack of centralized services for domestic violence victims. To combat this, the funding will allow for creation of a multi-disciplinary Domestic Violence High Risk Team (DVHRT) and an increase in funding for domestic violence community organizations. The DVHRT will include law enforcement, social service agencies and domestic violence community organizations. The multi-disciplinary team will meet regularly to monitor high-risk cases, share information, identify gaps, implement a coordinated intervention to mitigate danger and most importantly, increase access to services.

The DVHRT will provide the foundation for the long-term project of expanding the response to domestic violence by creating a Family Justice Center (FJC). An FJC will co-locate services including social services, community organizations and law enforcement partners. The FJC will allow community members experiencing domestic violence, sexual assault and/or human trafficking to receive one-stop access to services to include civil legal services, advocacy, mental health services, assistance applying for benefits, safety planning, and immigration legal services.

We believe that this proposal aligns with your demonstrated leadership and commitment to combatting domestic violence in our community. Thank you for your consideration.

Family Tree has been providing vital life-changing services to the Denver metro community for nearly 45 years, helping people prevent and overcome the interconnected issues of child abuse and neglect, domestic violence and homelessness.

Many of Family Tree's programs and services have been provided in partnership with Adams County and for the residents of this community, where leaders care about domestic violence survivors, but as community we have not always served them well. Adams County lacks important, necessary services for survivors of domestic violence. This lack of resources can lead to severe – even lethal – consequences. The COVID-19 pandemic has exacerbated this problem even further, resulting in a perfect storm with significantly increased demand for services and ongoing challenges of safely meeting these needs.

Because of your generous invitation to submit proposals for the FY2022 appropriations process, the Adams County community now has a chance to give domestic violence survivors the resources they desperately need. On behalf of Family Tree, we respectfully urge you to adopt Adams County Government and Judicial District 17's Community Project Funding Request "Expanding Services to Domestic Violence Victims in Adams County" and to submit it to the House Appropriations Committee for their consideration.

This proposal would lay the groundwork for a Family Justice Center in Adams County by funding a Domestic Violence High-Risk Team – initiatives with which Family Tree has played a significant leadership role in planning, designing and implementing in other metro area communities -- which would provide life-saving help to domestic violence survivors in Adams County. This would provide domestic violence victims with a variety of critical resources, including legal services, human services, mental health counseling, and victim/survivor advocacy that save lives when escaping from someone who is choosing to use abusive behaviors. Since we do not currently have a domestic violence shelter in Adams County, this proposal would also fund hotel vouchers to provide temporary housing for survivors who cannot safely return to their homes.

As law enforcement executives, one of the most intractable issues we have faced has been domestic violence. It happens in our most challenged neighborhoods and at the highest ends of the socio-economic spectrum. It might not respond to a crime strategy, an information campaign, or even a criminal charge. As problematic as it is for those of us working singularly within the criminal justice system, imagine how difficult it must be for repeat victims, their children, and the loved ones aware of their suffering but often powerless to help.

The proposal, "Expanding Services to Domestic Violence Victims in Adams County," would create and fund a multilingual Domestic Violence High Risk Team, which would assess lethality factors, and among other services, provide legal assistance, therapy, financial counseling, victim advocacy, and even childcare. 
